Diane Patrick is co-managing partner of law firm Ropes & Gray's Boston office and the former First Lady of Massachusetts. She has over 30 years of experience representing and advising employers in connection with a broad range of labor and employment-related matters. For the past five years, Diane has chaired the firm's diversity committee. Ropes & Gray has been recognized nationally for its diversity; women make up about 40 percent of the attorneys in its US offices, and minorities account for roughly 17 percent.

Diane provides strategic counseling to clients regarding their compliance with federal and state employment laws, represents clients before the National Labor Relations Board as well as other federal administrative agencies, counsels employers on matters involving wage and hour regulations, and provides general advice on employment policies and practices.
